

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# Chairman's Letter

Welcome to the new edition of the Banffshire Partnership Yearbook. As expected, it has been a very challenging year for everybody at the Partnership and I would like to thank Duncan Leece, his staff and especially the volunteers for all their efforts in meeting those challenges.

#### COMMUNITY TRANSPORT

Since the Community Transport side of the business started in 1999 it has grown steadily and is now the main activity of Banffshire Partnership.

The dial-a-bus service is very well used. The annual survey of our passengers shows how valuable this service is to them, not just getting them to the shops and on outings, but in terms of social interaction and helping to alleviate social exclusion. Community hire activity has reduced during the year and we would like to remind all local groups that our vehicles are available at very reasonable cost for outings, meetings, etc.

As well above half of the funding for Community Transport comes from Aberdeenshire Council grants, we are always looking at ways to make the operation more cost-effective. This is even more important now as we have seen a reduction in our budget allocation for this year and expect further reductions in the coming years.

#### TRAINING

For many years we have provided transport-related training to minibus drivers and Passenger Assistants. This year, in an effort to broaden our range, we are now able to offer a range of training courses in First Aid, Health & Safety At Work and Manual Handling.

We have already delivered training for local and national companies and community organisations. Feedback from our customers has been excellent.

# COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Now the smallest part of the activities of Banffshire Partnership in financial terms, the Community Economic Development side plays a very large role in the communities that it serves.

BPL is an active member of the Local Community Planning



Partnership and it has assisted many community groups with projects, business plans and funding applications over the years.

We have a paid contract with Aberdeenshire Council to provide this resource and without that income we would be unable to help community groups. Even so, we get more enquiries than we currently have resources, both human and financial to handle, so please be patient with us! This financial year saw a 20% cut in CED funding.

The board is very well aware that we face tightening budgets in the next few years. However, it is our wish to continue with the broad range of activities that we currently undertake and where possible expand them to meet community need.



Within our area (Aberchirder & Marnoch, Alvah & Forglen, Banff & Macduff, Cornhill & Ordiquhill, Fordyce & Sandend, King Edward & Gamrie, Portsoy, Whitehills), to contribute to the economic, social and environmental well-being of local communities by;

- valuing the work of volunteers
- creating opportunities for employment based on the sustainable use of local culture, skills and resources,
- enabling and encouraging lifelong learning amongst local people.

We also aim to encourage and support partnership working between community groups and private, public and voluntary organisations.

#### **VALUES:** We try to:

#### **OBJECTIVES:**

To encourage and support communities to run and participate in activity that will help them develop.

Provide rural transport solutions to individuals and communities, where mainstream public transport is inaccessible.

# **Banff Preservation & Heritage Society**

his year Bill Bain of Bodie's the Photographers, showed us old films of Banff.

There were, of course, crowds with flags (some well kent faces), and ladies curtseying to the Queen. But what we will remember was the film of the demolitions. Fine old buildings with years of life in them, were bull-dozed.

The catchword of the Town Council was "Ding em a' doon". The film was heartstopping to watch, though funny in places. They had no ideas of Health and Safety then: a huge cloud of dust filling Castle Street as a building came down

and suddenly a car came through it. They had not closed the road! Everyone in Banff should see that film.

When you look at that beautiful sandstone house on Low Street that escaped by the skin of its teeth last October, you realise that there are still goahead people in offices whose default is set to 'demolition'.

It did not cost a great deal to make that building safe and the Townscape Heritage Initiative has worked hard to ensure its future. But how near it was to destruction, with the skip there our Chairman had a very stressful fortyeight hours!

Buildings should not get to the stage of almost falling down.

We look, for example, at the old Tolbooth Hotel. A fine Regency building on the site of and probably incorporating bits of the town's Tolbooth, where the Council met. The ground floor is looked after, but our Society is worried about upstairs.

It is never good policy for an owner to let a building get into a really bad state. "A lick in time", as they used to say.

We have several schemes in train, beside our regular meetings and outings.

Having said that, Boyndie Visitor Centre weathered the storm better than many catering, tourism and retail businesses, and accordingly, Boyndie Trust remains a strong and stable communityled charity. I would like to thank publicly all those who have helped that happen, whether they be paid staff working here, loval customers, or our wonderful band of hard-working volunteers.

Many of our volunteers are on work placement training via Aberdeenshire Council Social Work and Employment Services. I can't count the number of customers visiting Boyndie each year who congratulate us on the standards those volunteers achieve and it is great to record that here too.

2012 will see some changes to Boyndie, as we seek to make the physical restrictions of our building more in line with the current needs of trade and training. The year will see an expansion of space for retailing both inside for gifts, and outside for plants. We will be upgrading our workshop spaces and creating a modern training suite. Those who know us well will be delighted to hear how we plan to address lack of car parking spaces too. The Trust has been successful in attracting LEADER funding to augment our reserves and pay for these vital improvements.

We doubled the size of Boyndie School, when we created the Visitor Centre as a social enterprise in 2003/4. The truth is, we wondered then if we would ever fill a building this size. Now it is busting at the seams, despite another extension in 2009!

There will be alterations and improvements to the training placements we have available too and technical changes to the commercial contract we have with Aberdeenshire Council. We have been doing a lot of work with Social Work managers in order to get the details right for everyone. All these new things are set to keep the facility at Boyndie in line with current needs and developing trends, thereby ensure maximum benefit to our community, plus long-term sustainability. Achieving that in times of recession, will be something to be very

proud of.

Our most visible activity has been to arrange two concerts a year. When the Friends of Duff House were no longer able to bring outreach groups from the Aberdeen International Youth Festival to this district, we took over that role. They come from all round the world, though this year's group were from Wigan and wowed us with a wonderful big-band Jazz sound. We intend to carry on this link with the International Youth Festival.

We have given grants to groups of young

musicians, like 'Inspire' Choir, but our dream of bringing really first-class performers who would also run workshops for students of their particular instruments, has not come off. We discover that young people studying music have a very full schedule and it may not be a kindness to cram more in.

We also thought of bringing music students from the university, but couldn't get them to come. The idea was that they would be role models for local young musicians. For our latest concert we brought musicians the Karin Leitner trio, of


And speaking of

# We Made It Happen By "Making it Real"

n an ideal world, genuine, practical advice Community from people who had experience in motivating Councils should be about people and making local people helping things happen. themselves. We all know the financial climate is appalling and hard working people increasingly choose whether it is worth

We arranged a public get together at a local venue and BPL employed their well proven methods, inviting everyone at this meeting to anonymously raise local issues by noting them on paper and handing them in. During a brief interlude BPL staff correlated all the feedback and categorised them for us and wrote them on a number of white boards located around the room. All attendees were then given a number of stickers to place next to the initiatives which they believed were most important to them.



BPL then took all the information away and transcribed it into a well established format creating our very own Local Community Plan. After our Community Council had liaised with BPL, they produced a professional document, which has been distributed to interested parties within our constituency. This plan is now used as New Aberdour, Tyrie and Pennan Community Council's "to do list."

In our case a key priority was for toilets at New Aberdour beach. To this end, a sub-committee was setup and through various local initiatives such as a local lottery and annual live music / BBQ evenings, we have been able to raise a couple thousand pounds towards the toilets.

BPL's Duncan Leece helped us pitch our case



for support for funding to the Banff and Buchan Community Planning Group (BBCPG), where he explained that we were a dynamic and proactive Community Council and as such. our views needed to be acted upon and not just listened to, in relation to funding in a difficult financial climate. In recognition of all the efforts made to date. BBCPG granted us funding for the balance of costs. We are on target to open the new toilets at New Aberdour beach sometime next spring. We have all had great fun in creating our own Local Community Plan and know that if you want, you can "Make It Real" too!

# Modern New Transport For All The Community

Banffshire Partnership has been providing a dial-a-bus service in the community for over ten years. In that time we have signed up over 500 clients. Currently, around 120 clients use the service at least once a month.

Shopping is the main request from our dial-a-bus services and we take our clients to and from places where they cannot get to on the normal bus service. To be eligible for the dial-a-bus service you need to have trouble getting to the shops. This may be because you don't have a car or the nearest bus stop is too far for you to walk to. We pick you up at your front door, take you to the shops (help you shop if you need help), pack your shopping in the bus and bring you and your shopping home to your front door. We are not in competition with the normal bus service, so you need to register with us before using the buses.

We also hire out our buses to community groups when they are not being used for the dial-a-bus service. The buses are available most afternoons. evenings and at weekends.

We provide a service in our

community in many ways:

#### Dial-a-bus

We have just taken ownership of two new buses which have been specially built with the shopping trips in mind. Both buses have internal tail lifts and plenty of storage space for all our clients' shopping

We cater for people who have difficulty using the normal bus service for various reasons including: Living more than a 1/2 mile from the nearest bus stop, being unable to carry shopping, being disabled or infirm. For many of our

clients the service also means

a social outing as it may be the only time from week to week that they get the chance to talk to others. All our diala-bus services operate with a driver and passenger assistant. They are there to help. The buses are out every day and depending on where you live you may have more than one opportunity to shop. We operate a first come first served booking service and you must book in advance. Please phone the office on 01261 843598 for more information or to register with us. We will then ask one of our staff to visit you at home. They will explain the service in more detail and make sure it suits your needs.

# **Community Minibuses**

We run our operations with three minibuses. Two of the buses are brand new and all three are available for hire by community groups who are registered with us. Two of the three buses can accommodate wheelchair passengers. These two buses also have a large capacity for shopping/luggage and can take up to 12 passengers or 11 passengers and one wheelchair. Our third bus can take 16 passengers. All three buses have side

steps. We encourage the community groups to have their own driver. However, we currently have a pool of paid and volunteer drivers who we can rely on.

As members of the Community Transport Association, we provide the nationally accredited Minibus Driver Awareness Scheme (MiDAS) training to everyone who drives our buses. Our charges are very competitive: please call us to find out the current charges.

#### **Volunteers**

A few committed and enthusiastic volunteers support our paid staff that drive the minibuses and act as passenger assistants. They all say that they find the work fun, sociable and rewarding and not in the least bit boring or difficult.
